- 1. The past continuous 'was discussing' describes an ongoing action interrupted by another past event. Teams often discuss strategies when unexpected announcements occur.
- 2. The future perfect continuous 'will have been negotiating' indicates an ongoing action that will continue up to a future point. Contract terms are often negotiated over weeks.
- 3. The present perfect continuous **'have been implementing'** describes an action that started in the past and continues to the present. Policies are often implemented over time.
- 4. The past perfect simple **'had increased'** is used to show that the action was completed before another past event. Companies often increase profits before economic downturns.
- 5. The future perfect continuous 'will have been working on' indicates an ongoing action that will continue up to a future point. Projects often require weeks of work.
- 6. The past continuous **'was finishing'** describes an ongoing action interrupted by another past event. Consultants often finish reports when clients arrive unexpectedly.
- 7. The future perfect continuous **'will have been developing'** indicates an ongoing action that will continue up to a future point. Product development often spans years before launch.
- 8. The present perfect 'has increased' is used for actions that started in the past and continue to the present. Mergers often lead to increased market share.
- 9. The past perfect continuous 'had been preparing' shows an ongoing action completed before another past event. Teams often prepare presentations for hours before disruptions.
- 10. The future perfect continuous 'will have been operating' indicates an ongoing action that will continue up to a future point. Businesses often track branch operations over time.
- 11. The past continuous **'was reviewing'** describes an ongoing action interrupted by another past event. Managers often review projects when unexpected calls occur.
- 12. The future perfect simple 'will have completed' is used to describe an action that will be finished before a specific future time. Companies often set deadlines for expansion plans.

- 13. The present perfect continuous 'have been using' is used to describe an action that started in the past and continues to the present. Businesses often use software over long periods.
- 14. The past perfect continuous **'had been leading'** indicates an ongoing action that was completed in the past. CEOs often lead companies for extended periods before retiring.
- 15. The past perfect simple 'had completed' is used to show that the action was finished before another past event. In business, reports are often completed before meetings.
