Answer Key:

- 1. 'The icing on the cake' means an additional benefit or bonus. For example, getting a bonus at work after a promotion is the icing on the cake.
- 2. **'Eat humble pie'** means to admit a mistake and apologize. For example, **if** someone is proven wrong, they might have to eat humble pie and apologize.
- 3. 'Bread and butter' means the main source of income. For example, if someone relies on teaching for their income, teaching is their bread and butter.
- 4. 'Sour grapes' means pretending to dislike something you can't have. For example, if someone fails to get a job and says they didn't want it anyway, it's sour grapes.
- 5. 'Apple of my eye' means someone cherished above others. For example, a parent might call their child the apple of their eye, showing deep affection.
- 6. 'Take with a grain of salt' means to view something skeptically or not take it too seriously. For example, if someone exaggerates, you take their words with a grain of salt.
- 7. 'Cry over spilled milk' means being upset about something that cannot be changed. For example, regretting a past mistake is like crying over spilled milk.
- 8. 'Full of beans' means being very energetic and lively. For example, a child running around and playing energetically is full of beans.
- 9. 'Cool as a cucumber' means being very calm and composed, even in stressful situations. For example, staying calm during a presentation shows you're cool as a cucumber.
- 10. 'Egg on your face' means to be embarrassed or look foolish. For example, if you make a mistake in public, you might feel like you have egg on your face.
- **11. 'Bring home the bacon'** means to earn money to support a family. For example, **if someone works to pay the bills, they are bringing home the bacon.**
- **12. 'In a pickle'** means being in a difficult or tricky situation. For example, **if you** forget your homework at home, you might say you're in a pickle.

- 13. 'Spill the beans' means to reveal a secret or disclose information. For example, if someone accidentally tells a surprise party plan, they have spilled the beans.
