**i** The sentence uses the second conditional, which describes an unlikely or hypothetical situation in present. 'Won' is the past simple tense required for this conditional type.

## 2. If he \_\_\_\_\_ (study) harder, he would have passed the exam.

- A studies
- B has studied
- C studied
- D had studied

**i** This is a third conditional sentence, used for past hypothetical situations. 'Had studied' uses the past perfect tense, suitable for this condition.

## 3. If it \_\_\_\_\_ (rain) tomorrow, we will cancel the picnic.

- A rained

- D has rained

**i** This sentence uses the first conditional, commonly used for real conditions referring to future possibilities. 'Rains' is present simple, which fits the pattern: if + present simple, will + base verb.

**i** This sentence uses a mixed conditional, which refers to a past condition with a present result. 'Had read' is correct.
